

## Spelling list: Some common homophones - set 1

Homophones are words that sound the same but have different meanings and spellings, which can lead to confusion in writing. Words like *their* , *there* , and *they're* are some of the most common homophones in English: *their* shows possession, *there* refers to a place, and *they're* is a contraction of *they are* . It's easy to mix them up, especially when writing quickly. To avoid mistakes, it's essential to know the correct spelling of each word and understand their meanings.

their	<b>Their</b> means 'belonging to them.'.
there	Don't put it here, put it over <b>there</b> .
they're	I wonder why <b>they're</b> so late.
your	Can I help you with <b>your</b> bags?
you're	<b>You're</b> looking very smart today.
to	We went <b>to</b> the party.
too	The cake mixture was <b>too</b> runny.
two	The <b>two</b> of us will go together.
some	I can toast <b>some</b> cheese.
sum	The <b>sum</b> of 10 and 10 is 20.
by	The plane was delayed <b>by</b> fog.
buy	She wants to <b>buy</b> a new dress.
bye	<b>Bye bye</b> is another way of saying 'goodbye'.
