

Spelling list: ow - longer words

The ow spelling is used to represent the sound /ou/ in longer words, especially before the endings *el* and *er* . It also appears at the end of words or syllables. Examples include:

- *cower* – I *cower* in fear.
- *flower* – The gardener picked a beautiful *flower* .

To reinforce this pattern, try a spelling activity or game with these words and see how many you can spell correctly!

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| cower | I cower in terror. |
| flower | There's a flower seller at the station. |
| power | It won't work if you don't switch on the power . |
| shower | I have a shower after football training. |
| tower | The tower was a unique construction. |
| towel | The baby was wrapped in a towel . |
| trowel | We use a trowel to put the cement on the bricks. |
| vowel | This course teaches you about vowels. |
| allow | The council won't allow any more houses here. |
| endow | A rich business man will endow our new town library. |
| eyebrow | She can raise one eyebrow at a time. |
| coward | He was considered to be a coward by his comrades. |
| powder | How much curry powder shall I use? |
| rowdy | His rowdy drunken shouting made us very angry. |
